### Overview of the Collection

The Windsor Historical Society Oral History Collection is an artificial collection of oral history interviews and other recorded memoirs, public presentations, and short historical essays which have been transcribed by Society staff and volunteers. The earliest recordings were made in 1952, but the collection spans to the present day. A few of the transcripts were prepared from videotaped recordings. Virtually all the recordings are now available in digital format.

Oral history themes and topics include neighborhood and family history; childhood chores and fun; school days; learning to drive; hunting, fishing, and other sports; working tobacco; church activities; and fondly remembered local stores, shopkeepers, and home delivery services. Recorded lectures and programs provide insight into history of the Lithuanian community in Poquonock; the mills along the Farmington River; the history of the Hayden Station area; Christopher Miner Spencer's many accomplishments; and Windsor's brickmaking industry. Some narrators offer perspective on the changes in the town of Windsor, CT during the 20<sup>th</sup> century, considering aspects such as the postwar housing shortages, race relations, and the impact of the opening of Interstate 91.

There are currently 115 transcripts in the collection, most with a detailed index. This inventory lists the name of the narrator, the date of the recording, the collection number, and a brief abstract of the contents. Some transcripts are filed in the library, and others are available on our website.

Maps of the area and conjectural drawings of the historic buildings made by Robert Redmond and Don Lang were shown. In the nineteenth century four other industries used the power supplied by the Mill Brook. These were William Shelton's hat manufacturing concern, a paper mill, the Bedortha Brothers factory which made levels and blocks, and the Windsor Cannery. Fowles researched the topic by talking to family members of the businesses in the area, walking the terrain, and searching for documents, maps, and records.
