This work by the late Lou Fowles, for many years a teacher of history at Loomis as well as the town's unofficial historian, was completed and edited by Society member, William Uricchio. The book was published as the School's gift to the town for the Bicentennial and will be donated to the Windsor Historical Society for its use and distribution at the meeting on March 10.
