Biographical Note

The Barbers were a multi-generational family of lifelong Windsor, CT residents, descending from Thomas Barber who arrived in Windsor in 1635.

A fourth-generation descendant of Windsor founder Thomas Barber, Jerijah Barber, Sr. was born on January 26, 1738/1739. He married Loanna Filley on December 5, 1765, and the couple had six children. Jerijah Barber, Sr. operated a tannery at Mill Brook in Windsor, CT, until about 1788. Barber was the executor of his father John Barber's estate, as well as the estate of his wife's grandfather, the Deacon William Cook. Jerijah Barber, Sr. died on February 7, 1792.

Jerijah Barber, Jr. was born on August 24, 1766. He inherited his father's tannery and expanded the business. He entered into a business arrangement with the Connecticut Militia to make leather shoes in 1779. Although his involvement with the Connecticut Militia initially appeared to be a business arrangement, it eventually became a more personal commitment. In 1803, Jonathan Trumbull appointed Jerijah Jr. Captain of the 2nd Company of the 1st Regiment of the Connecticut Militia.

In addition to his business and military careers, Jerijah Barber, Jr. was very involved in Windsor affairs. He, along with Peter Brown, repeatedly petitioned the County Court in Hartford to approve a highway connecting the towns of Windsor and Suffield. The court tentatively approved the idea, suggesting that the road should take a different route to be more "commodious to the public and less injurious to individuals." The town records in the collection illustrate the reluctance on the part of the townspeople to accept a highway, and eventually they elected to alter the original plan for the highway, as the court had suggested.

Jerijah Barber, Jr. married twice: his first marriage to Deborah Dexter produced two children: Deborah and Fidelia. His second marriage to Anna Hayden, daughter of Captain Nathaniel Hayden, produced six children: Nathaniel Hayden, Rhoda Ann, Mary Jane, John Henry, Samuel Thomas, and Samuel Jerijah. Jerijah Barber, Jr. died March 21, 1820.

Like his father, Nathaniel Hayden Barber was involved in civic affairs and was elected to the Connecticut Senate in 1862 for District 3. Nathaniel Hayden Barber was the longest lived of Jerijah's children, dying at age 81 in 1888.

Scope and Contents

The collection primarily consists of a variety of business records and personal papers of Jerijah Barber, Sr. and Jerijah Barber, Jr., lifelong residents of Windsor, CT. These records include an account booklet, contracts for laborers, and agreements for apprentices for their tannery business. Deeds, land records, and a property survey are also included in the documents. The collection contains estate papers, many of which were executed by either the elder or younger Jerijah. Some of Jerijah Barber, Jr.'s military records are included, which are composed of enlistment lists and orders.

A few of Nathaniel Hayden Barber's papers are collected here, particularly deeds and the letter of his appointment to the position of senator in 1862. The collection also contains some of the papers of Jerijah Sr.'s father-in-law, Amos Filley. Additionally, the collection contains papers not directly belonging to the Barber family, in particular, Windsor town records, specifically minutes of town meetings, petitions, and documents relating to town business for the period between 1786 and 1790.

Custodial and Administrative History

Materials for the Jerijah Barber Papers were first donated to the Windsor Historical Society in 1993. An inventory titled "Items in Barber Attic" was received with the collection, but has been difficult to correlate all the documents in the collection with the inventory. Volunteer Gary Wait partially processed the collection in the fall of 2003. Intern Rebecca Reel did further processing, arranged the materials, and prepared the finding aid in June 2009 under the supervision of librarian Barbara Goodwin.

Michelle Tom added to this finding aid the Barber family account books, which are a mix of Found in Collection items, and items donated in 1970 by Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Barber.
